Answer THREE questions.

1. Explain and discuss Kant's view that things-in-themselves do not stand in spatial relations to each other.
2. How does Kant relate his tables of judgments and categories? Are any instances of the relation plausible?
3. Critically evaluate the Transcendental Deduction of the Categories.
4. Discuss Kant's view that the principle of cause and effect gives an experiencing subject a way of distinguishing between subjective and objective time orders.
5. Is idealism refuted by the Refutation of Idealism?
6. Does Kant succeed in showing that transcendental freedom is compatible with universal natural causal necessity?
7. Does Kant succeed in showing that the supreme principle of rational action is the Categorical Imperative?
8. Discuss and evaluate Kant's claim that only the good will has unconditional value.
9. How plausible is Kant's position that acknowledgement of morality commits us to belief in the immortality of the soul and the existence of God?
10. How does Kant reconcile his claim that aesthetic judgments are not based on concepts with his claim that they are judgments?
11. Does Kant succeed in effecting a deduction of judgements of taste?

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12. State and assess Kant's account of EITHER the mathematically sublime OR the dynamically sublime.
