We also organise regular careers talks with the support of alumni, the Franco-British Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and the British Embassy in Paris.




Benefits of Studying Abroad



Deciding to study and live abroad is a bold move, a serious step that requires a certain level of maturity and commitment compared to your peers. It is also a personally enriching experience as your day to day interactions with people from different cultures will teach you to broaden your horizons and cultivate cultural awareness. It is also an unforgettable experience, during which you will form long-lasting friendships.

STEPPING OUTSIDE ONE'S COMFORT ZONE

By stepping into an unfamiliar social, cultural and professional environment, you demonstrate to future employers your ability to step outside of your comfort zone, your openness to new challenges, and your ability to adapt to any situation. It shows your determination, your ability to take risks and your confidence to go out and experience something new.

BUILDING TRANSVERSAL SKILLS

On a daily basis, you will have to learn to fend for yourself, be flexible and communicate in another language. Without noticing it you might develop project management skills as you deal and juggle with your responsibilities. As you grow independent and confident, you will also learn to be more resilient and refine your decision making skills. You'll become a real problem-solver and develop or consolidate your language skills, skills that are sought after among recruiters.



BENEFITS

Studying abroad will boost your résumé as you will have developed sought after skills gained by your international experience that will make you stand out from the crowd of job-seeking graduates. It will also open the doors to various opportunities in international organisations and businesses.

According to Universities UK International's Gone International report, "There is a correlation between outward mobility and improved academic and employment outcomes. Graduates who were mobile during their degree were less likely to be unemployed (3.7% compared to 4.9%)" and "Those in work were more likely to be in a graduate level job (76.4% compared to 69.9%) and earn 5% more than their non-mobile peers."

I wanted to speak a foreign language fluently. I picked this French Studies degree because it incorporated other interests in humanities, such as Literature and History. How did you end up in your current position?


After graduating, I got a job working at the ICC International Court of Arbitration in Paris. Working there encouraged me to pursue law. I did an English law degree remotely, then returned to UK in 2019 to complete my studies and work in a UK law firm. I applied to be a trainee solicitor and started my training contract in March 2021.

What advice or tips would you give to current Institute in Paris students thinking about their future careers?

Go to external career fairs while you're studying; Sign up to expat recruiters; Speak to alumni to help you get jobs; get employed in Paris to ensure your French reaches business standards; brush off mistakes, be prepared for rejections, don't let it get you down; Remember that by being at the University of London Institute in Paris you have life/ academic experience that very very few people can boast in the UK.

What skills did your time at the Institute in Paris give you which have been helpful for your career?


The experience taught me to be brave and push myself to speak in French even if I didn't quite have all the words yet. At first I was a little embarrassed to get it wrong (Parisians are slightly unforgiving when they detect an English accent!) but you've just got to keep practising, whatever it may be and you'll get there.

Do you have any words of wisdom you could offer University of London alumni who are looking to set up their own business?

Without doubt, I'd say find your passion and grasp it with both hands. I could not have set up on my own without asking lots of questions and building up a trusted network of industry contacts first. That combination has been invaluable to me.

What inspired you to pursue postgraduate studies, and how did your time at the Institute in Paris help prepare you for it?

ULIP was instrumental in preparing me for postgraduate studies. My final year, in particular, was essential in motivating me to pursue a Master's degree. I had to dedicate myself as never before to achieve my academic objective, forcing me to organise my time and work on a consistent basis.

What life lesson did you learn at the Institute in Paris that will help you going forward?
