

BA French Studies

- 'Language' courses (ULL) and 'Content' courses (ULC)
- Opportunity to choose from a broad range of 'Content' courses (literature, visual culture, history, business, linguistics, cinema, politics)
- Taught predominantly in French –
 between 65-80% of classes taught in
 French, depending on Options in BA2
 and BA3 (lower for students taking
 Minors in Business, IR or History)






SME Omnibus Survey
